Mattie suffered a massive stroke a few years ago, and Audrey was diagnosed with diabetes. Both women have changed their eating habits and incorporated exercise into their lives, and they share their stories and recipes in the upcoming book.

As “The Sunshine Girl,” she hosts a weekly gospel radio show that airs from 11 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturdays on gospel station WTOW 1320 in Washington, N.C.

Audrey earned an associate's degree in Early Childhood Education from Pitt Community College and then attended East Carolina University, where she graduated Magna Cum Laude with a degree in Family and Community Services. She also earned a master's degree in Child Development/Family Relations from ECU.

She is a member of the Golden Key Honor Society, was chosen Who's Who among Entrepreneurs in 1999, and received the Governor Hunt award in 2000 for outstanding community services.

She has four children and six grandchildren. She also bakes cakes from scratch and is a certified manicurist.
